



## New Board Member's mini bio

### James Edward Jordan

■ James E. Jordan, is a retired business executive and active director of public companies, investment funds, and not-for-profit organizations. Mr. Jordan retired in 2006 as Managing Director of Arnhold and S. Bleichroeder Advisers, Inc., ("ASB") a 200 year old privately owned asset management company, managing approximately \$50 billion in mutual funds, funds of funds, and hedge funds. ASB is best known as the manager of the value discipline First Eagle Funds, and he continues as a director of the those funds. For many years prior to joining ASB, he was a Consultant to The Jordan Company ("TJC"), a private investment banking firm which acquires companies for its partnership account. During those years, he served as President and Chief Investment Officer of the William Penn Funds, a mutual fund business based in Reading, Pennsylvania, which he owned with his Jordan Company colleagues. The William Penn Company was sold in 1997 to the Federated Funds Company in a successful all-cash transaction. For TJC, in 1984 Mr. Jordan helped organize the \$500 million investment trust company, JZ Capital Partners, Inc., now based in Guernsey, with shares traded on the London Stock Exchange, and he continues as a director of JZ Capital. Mr. Jordan has been a director of Leucadia National Corporation ("LUK" on the NYSE), which owns a variety of companies, since 1978. He served as a director of Florida East Coast Industries, Inc., a railroad and land management company, until its sale in 2007 ; and he was also a director of Consolidated-Tomoka Land Company, a land development company based in Daytona Beach, Florida. Mr. Jordan is active in environmental organizations, presently serving on the Chairman's Committee of Conservation International, and on the board of Pro Natura de Yucatan. He is also very active in historic preservation, serving as Vice Chairman of the World Monuments Fund. He holds a BA from the University of South Florida, and MA, MIA, and MBA degrees from Columbia University, where he served on the Dean's Advisory Board of the School of International and Public Affairs for many years.
